Waterfront Park Update by: John Powell, City Engineer




The second phase of Waterfront Park is almost complete. Boardwalk frame work and decking is approximately 75% complete.

The storm sewer system is complete, and the 10' sidewalk path, grass parking area, trailside facilities, and new entry drive is underway.

Planting of the wetland restoration area is to take place February 25, 2017, and was a joint effort with Tampa Bay Estuary and Tampa Bay Watch.


Look for a Grand Opening in Spring 2017.

The City's operating millage rate for fiscal year 2017 is 3.9500 mills. The millage rate is 2.42 percent lower than the prior two years. Your taxes may be slightly higher as overall property values in the City increased by 5.98 percent. Your property tax bill contains more than just City taxes. You also pay property tax to the Pinellas County Board of Commissioners, Emergency Management Services, Pinellas Planning Council, Juvenile Welfare Board, School Board, Southwest Florida Water Management District, and the Pinellas Suncoast Transit Authority. Your Safety Harbor City taxes make up twenty cents of every dollar of your total property tax bill.



Where the Money Comes From

For financial reporting, the City maintains 18 individual governmental funds. Governmental funds are primarily supported by tax dollars and are used to account for the City's basic services provided, including general government, public safety, transportation, physical environment, culture and recreation, debt service, and transfers. The majority of services provided are supported through property tax, utility tax, franchise fees, state shared taxes, and direct services revenues. Municipal property tax collections makes up 25 percent of the total governmental fund revenues. The City has experienced its fourth increase in real property taxable values in fiscal year 2017 after six years of declining taxable values.



Where the Money Goes To

Total City governmental fund expenditures of \$20.1 million decreased by a nominal .25 percent from estimated fiscal year end 2016. Library, Parks and Recreation, followed by Public Safety, Fire and Law Enforcement, continue to be high priorities within the community. As the economy has slowly improved over the last four years, the City Commission's goals for the business and economic environment, regulatory requirements, the environment, capital projects, and a fiscally strong City have been in the forefront of the City budget as a policy document. Exercise may be the only true anti-aging medicine. Anyone, at any age, can improve muscle strength and endurance. Exercise helps maintain bone mineral density, and active older adults have better cholesterol levels than those who are inactive.

But aging brings changes to all body systems that can impact peak performance:

- Maximal oxygen intake decreases, even in those who remain active.
- Muscle strength and bone mineral density decline.
- Risk for heart disease increases with age.
- Older athletes have less body water, thirst sensation declines, and kidney function is not as efficient in regulating fluids.
- Medications for high blood pressure, high cholesterol, and arthritis can impact exercise.

Because of these changes, strategies to prevent dehydration and ensure proper nutrition are important for older athletes to obtain a safe and productive workout and to reach peak performance.
