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INTRODUCTION



Background

- **The City of Safety Harbor has hired Collaborative Labs of St. Petersburg College to help develop a clear and unified vision of what the city should become during the next five to 10 years.** This ***Visioning*** process is currently underway and is comprised of:
 - Facilitation of group conversations with leaders of selected constituents – residents, businesses and community organizations.
 - Upcoming community forums which will be open for attendance by the public.
 - An opt-in online survey of community residents accessed via the city’s website.

- **In an effort to help assure the views and needs of the city’s residents are understood, the City Commission has requested a telephone survey with a representative sample of the city’s residents.**

Purpose And Research Objectives

- The purpose of the research is to help the City Commission and Collaborative Labs better understand the issues and desires of the residents of Safety Harbor.
- It addressed the following research objectives.
 - Understanding the motivations leading residents to choose to live in Safety Harbor
 - Identifying perceived greatest strengths of the city
 - Examining the level of satisfaction with city services
 - Understanding feelings about the direction in which the quality of life in Safety Harbor has been moving
 - Identifying the top priorities to make Safety Harbor a better place to live
 - Measuring the desired degree of development in the downtown area
 - Identifying the types of businesses they would like to see more of
- In conjunction with the learning from the key constituency sessions and public Community Forums which Collaborative Labs has facilitated, **this research will be used, to help identify a vision of the future for Safety Harbor.**

Research Method

- **Who:** 386 Safety Harbor residents 18+ years of age, who:
 - Do not work for the city, a developer, or a marketing research company
 - Reflect gender and age proportions for Safety Harbor 18+ year olds reported in the 2000 US Census.
 - Gender -- Males = 47% / Females = 53%
 - Age groups -- 18 – 34 = 18%, 35 – 44 = 25%, 45 – 64 = 37%, 65 + = 20%
 - This sample size yields total percentage estimates within +/- 5.1 percentage points at the 95 percent level of confidence.
- **What:** Telephone interviews conducted via CATI (computer aided telephone interview).
- **Where/How:** Stratified random sample of listed and RDD households.
 - Communications Center Inc. randomly called sample households and asked to speak to someone in an open age/gender quota group.
 - All available RDD and Listed sample was called at least 3 times. Due to lower than desired number of 18 – 44 year olds responding to the survey, the data was weighted to reflect the gender and age proportions of the US Census. This is a commonly accepted research practice and helps assure the data analyzed best reflects the population of the area being studied.
 - Interview Length averaged 13 minutes
- **When:** September 23 – October 3, 2007



RESEARCH CONCLUSIONS

Research Conclusions

- Safety Harbor's residents
 - Believe they live in a great location.
 - Love the city's small town atmosphere and sense of community.
- Most feel :
 - The city is moving in the right direction
 - The city services provided are meeting their needs
- They would like to see the city retain this small town atmosphere as the city plans and takes actions for the future. This means:
 - Residents want reassurances the small town character with parks, open spaces, neighborhoods and current building heights will continue to exist, so they can continue to enjoy the lifestyle, sense of community and atmosphere that led them to choose to live in Safety Harbor.
- Top priorities for making Safety Harbor a better place to live are:
 - Assuring public safety
 - Preserving the environment
- Most residents would like to see gradual redevelopment of the downtown without buildings taller than three stories.
- Redevelopment efforts should focus on addressing traffic and parking issues and in bringing more dining and retail stores to the downtown area.



Research Conclusions

- Safety Harbor residents' vision of the future could be expressed as one of a small vibrant safe town with:
 - A sense of community
 - Beautiful parks, open spaces and landscaping
 - Some added specialty retail stores and restaurants
 - Good schools
 - Improved traffic flow and parking
 - Buildings of the height that currently exist
 - Programs in place and actions taken to:
 - Preserve or improve the environment
 - Assure the availability of affordable housing
 - Provide desired leisure activities
 - Help with economic development
 - A responsive city government that works together to assure the city's residents can continue to enjoy their special community and lifestyle.

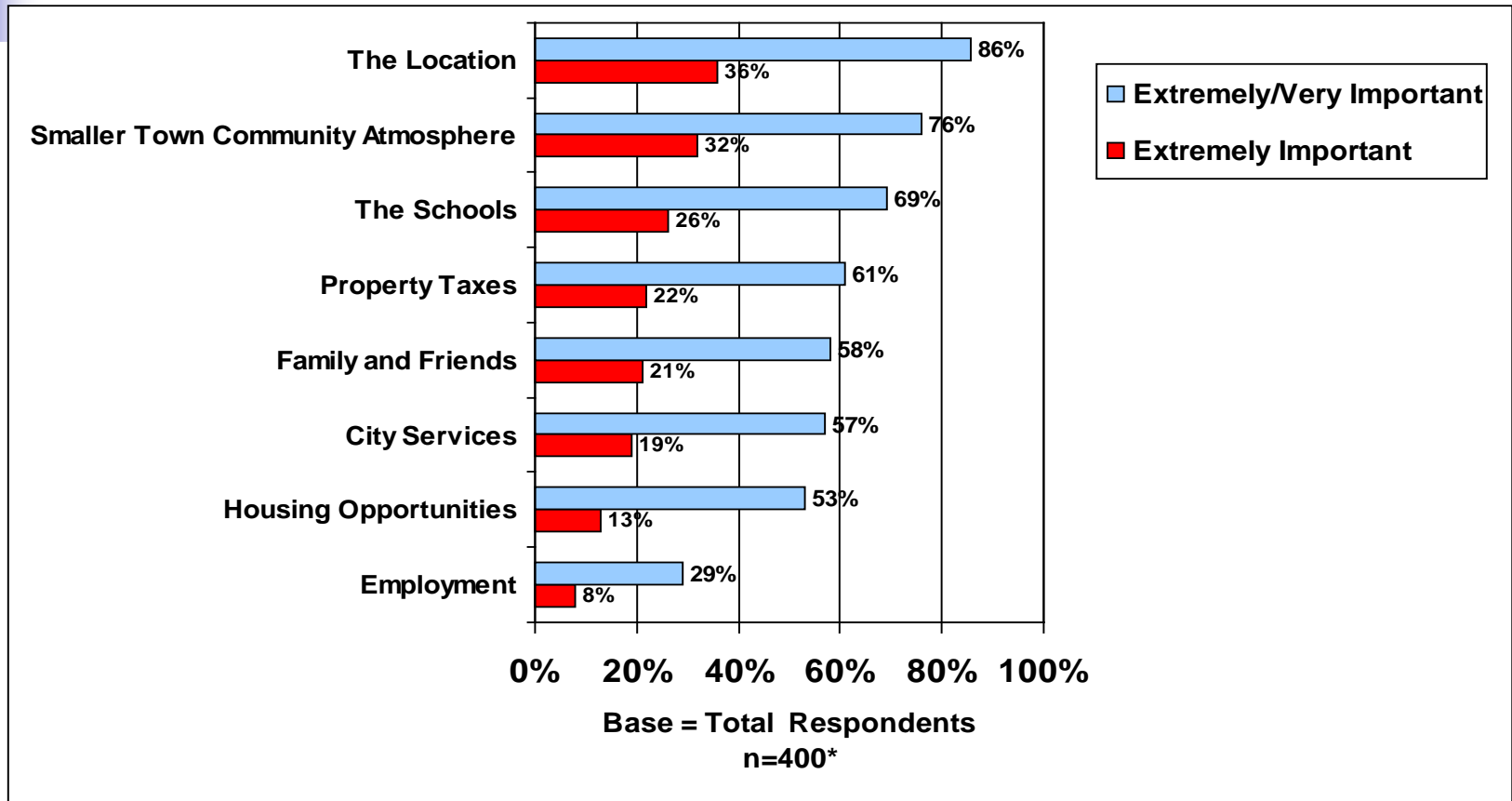

Why Residents Choose To Live In Safety Harbor

- Safety Harbor's location and its small town community atmosphere are the **two most significant reasons** for people for choosing to live in the city.
 - More the 3 in 4 residents said these two reasons were extremely or very important in their choice.
 - About 1 in 3 said it was extremely important
 - **When asked the most important factor and the second most important factor in their decision, location and small town community atmosphere were the prime considerations.**
- The schools were another key factor for most people.
- Of the other reasons examined, only one, employment, was seen as extremely or very important by less than half of those surveyed (29%).

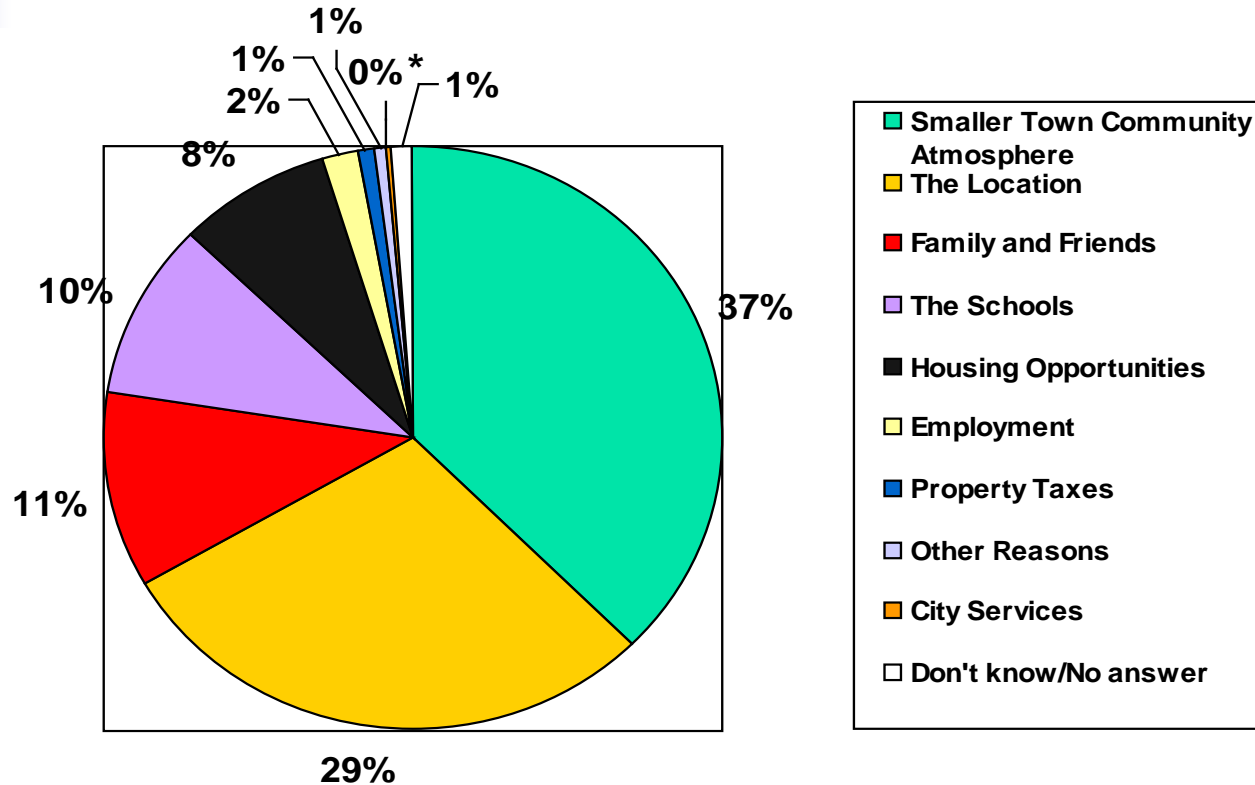
Importance In Choosing To Live In Safety Harbor

Reasons For Choosing To Live In Safety Harbor Most Important Reason

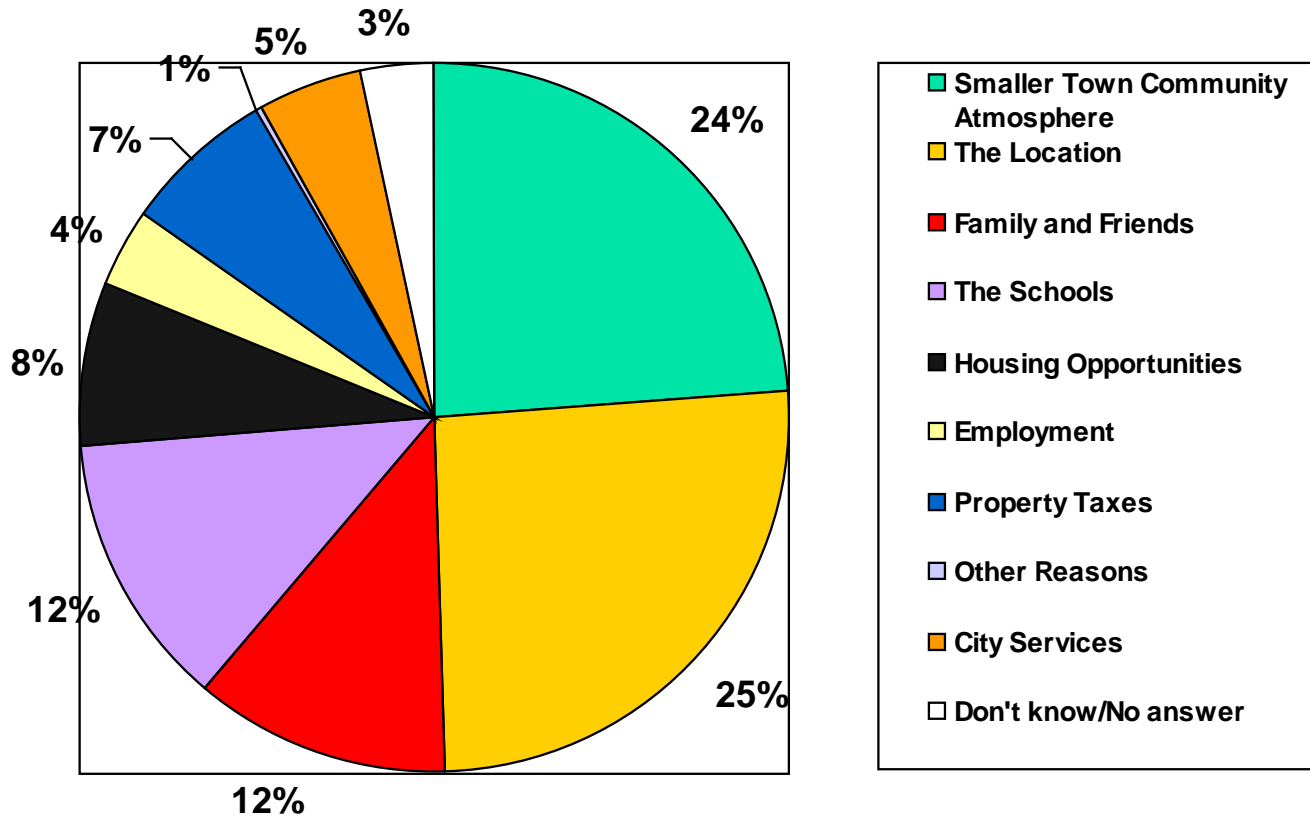

Why Residents Choose To Live In Safety Harbor – Differences in Priorities Noted Among Sub-groups

- **Location** and **small town community atmosphere** were among the most important factors to the greatest percentage of all the key Safety Harbor community subgroups evaluated.
- **Beyond the location and small town community atmosphere, some importance differences are noted when one looks at reasons for choosing Safety Harbor by gender, age, household size and household income:**
 - More **Women** placed importance on schools and property taxes than did men.
 - Fewer **People 65+** placed importance on schools, while more assigned importance to city services and family and friends.
 - More **Younger People** (18 -34) placed importance on family and friends, schools, and employment.
 - A greater percentage of **Households with 3+ People** placed **importance** on schools.
 - More **Households Earning Under \$50,000** cited the importance of housing opportunities. They also tended to include concerns about economic related issues – property taxes and employment.

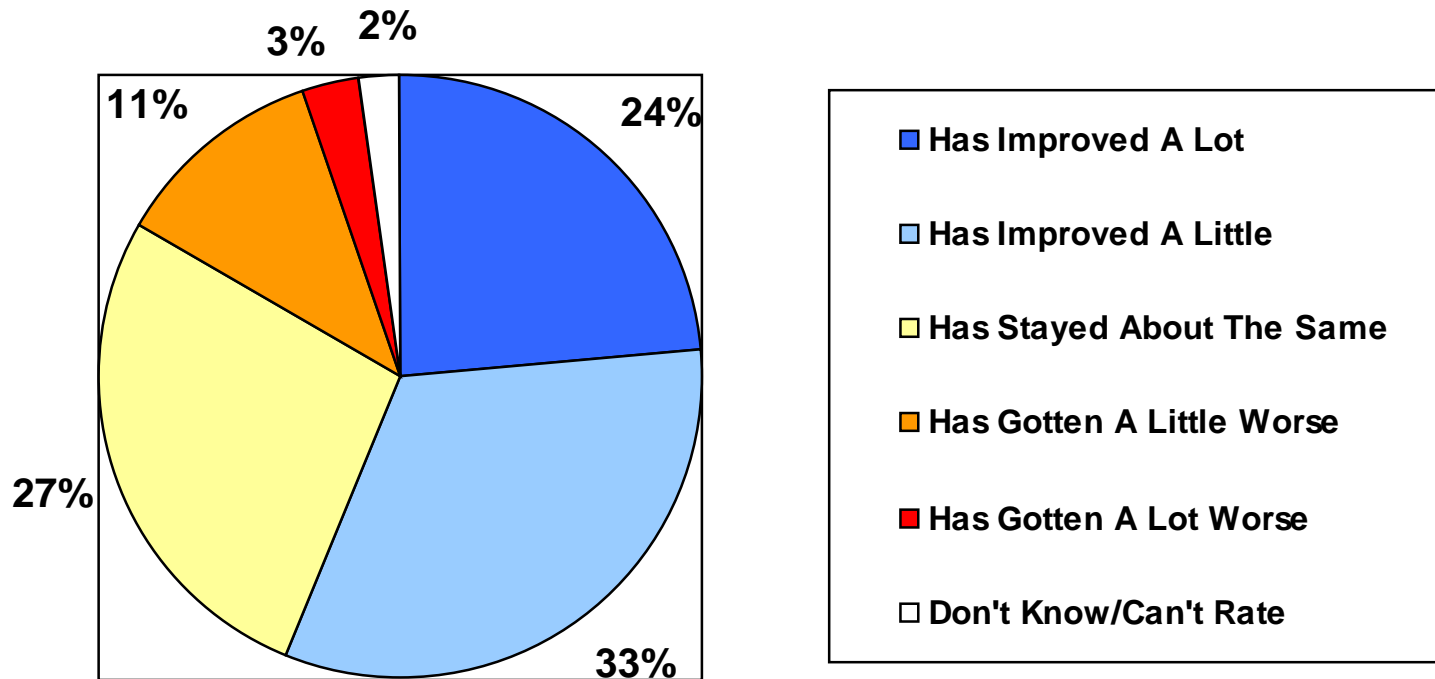
Views Of The Past And The Present

Residents Views Of Direction, Which Life In The City Has Been Heading, During The Past Few Years

- A solid majority of residents feel life in Safety Harbor has been improving (57%). Those feeling things have improved point to:
 - Improvements made to the downtown.
 - Recreational events.
- Another 27% feel things have stayed about the same.
- 14% feel life in the city has declined. Those feeling things have declined point to:
 - Overdevelopment.
 - Acrimony with the city politics/government.
 - Expenses/taxes.

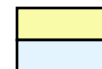



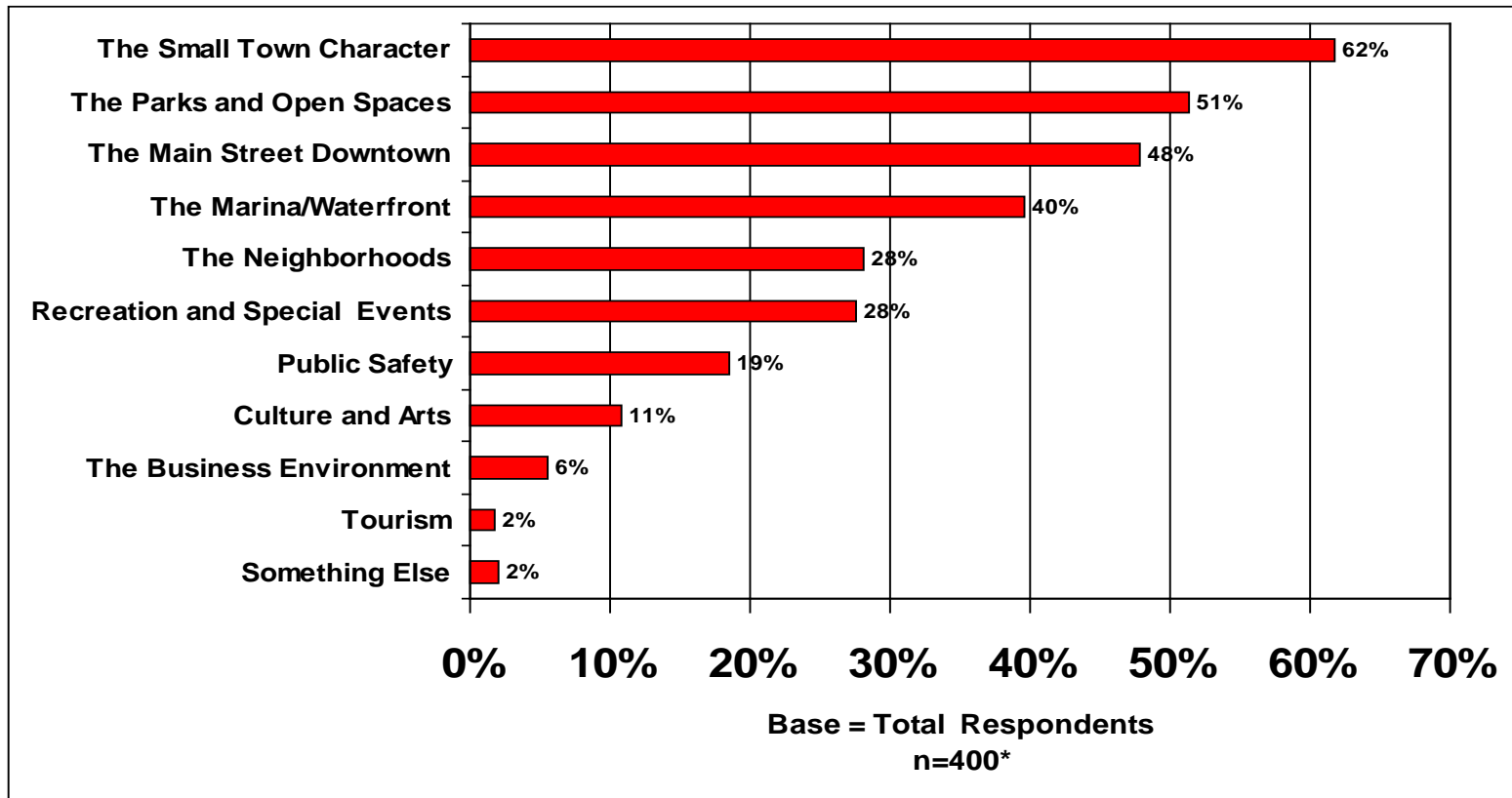

Safety Harbor's Greatest Strengths

- Consistent with being a top reason for residents choosing to live in Safety Harbor, **6 in 10 feel the small town character is one of the city's greatest strengths.**
- **About half of the residents point to the parks and open spaces and the downtown main street as being key strengths.**
- Four in 10 point to the waterfront and marina.
- Few feel the business environment, culture and arts, or tourism are among the city's greatest strengths.

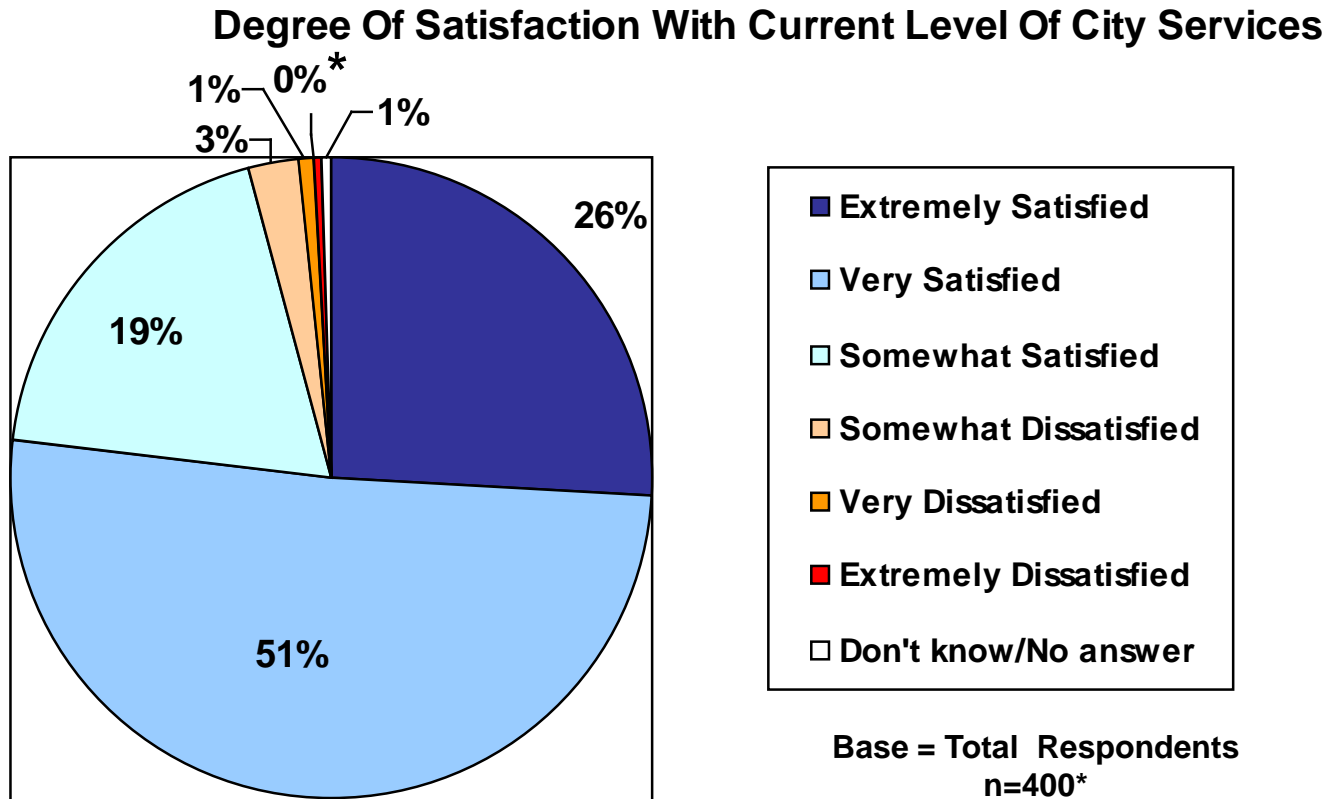
Q10-Which of the following do you feel are Safety Harbor's three greatest strengths?

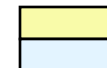

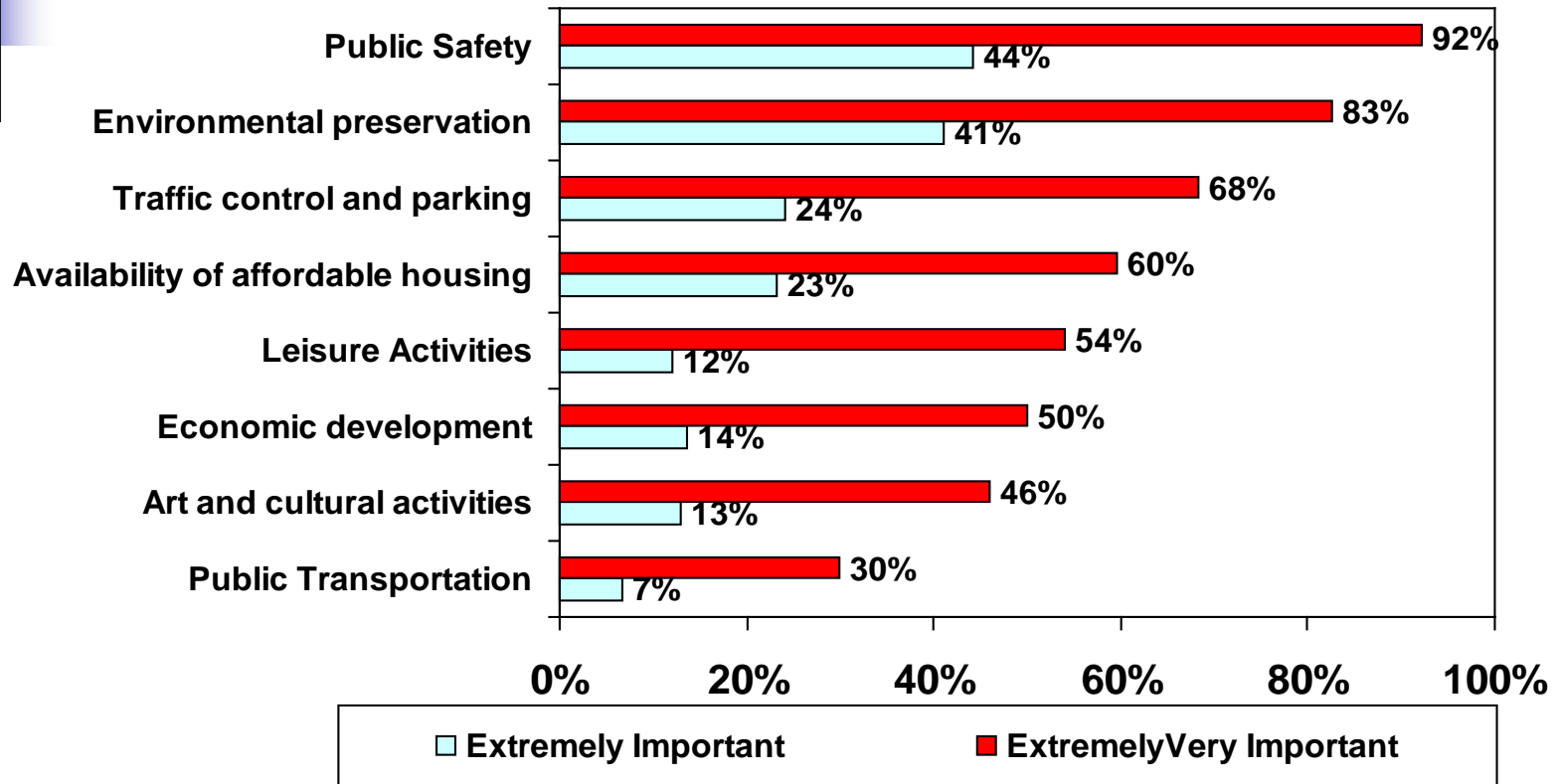


The Desired Future And How To Get There

Priorities For Making Safety Harbor A Better Place To Live

- Two priorities associated with assuring the community in which they live is a safe one, stand out as the top priorities for making Safety Harbor a better place to live in the next five years. These two priorities would fit at the base of Maslow's hierarchy of needs and were highly important to all key demographic subgroups. They are:
 - Public Safety.
 - Environmental preservation.
- Following these as top priorities are:
 - Traffic control and parking.
 - Economic development.
 - Availability of affordable housing.
- While not superseding the top level priorities, a few differences in the degree of importance among some key subgroups are:
 - More women than men assigned a high level of importance to leisure activities.
 - More people 65+ assigned a high level of importance to public transportation than did the other age groups.
 - Fewer households earning \$100,000 or more assigned a high level of importance to the availability of affordable housing or public transportation.

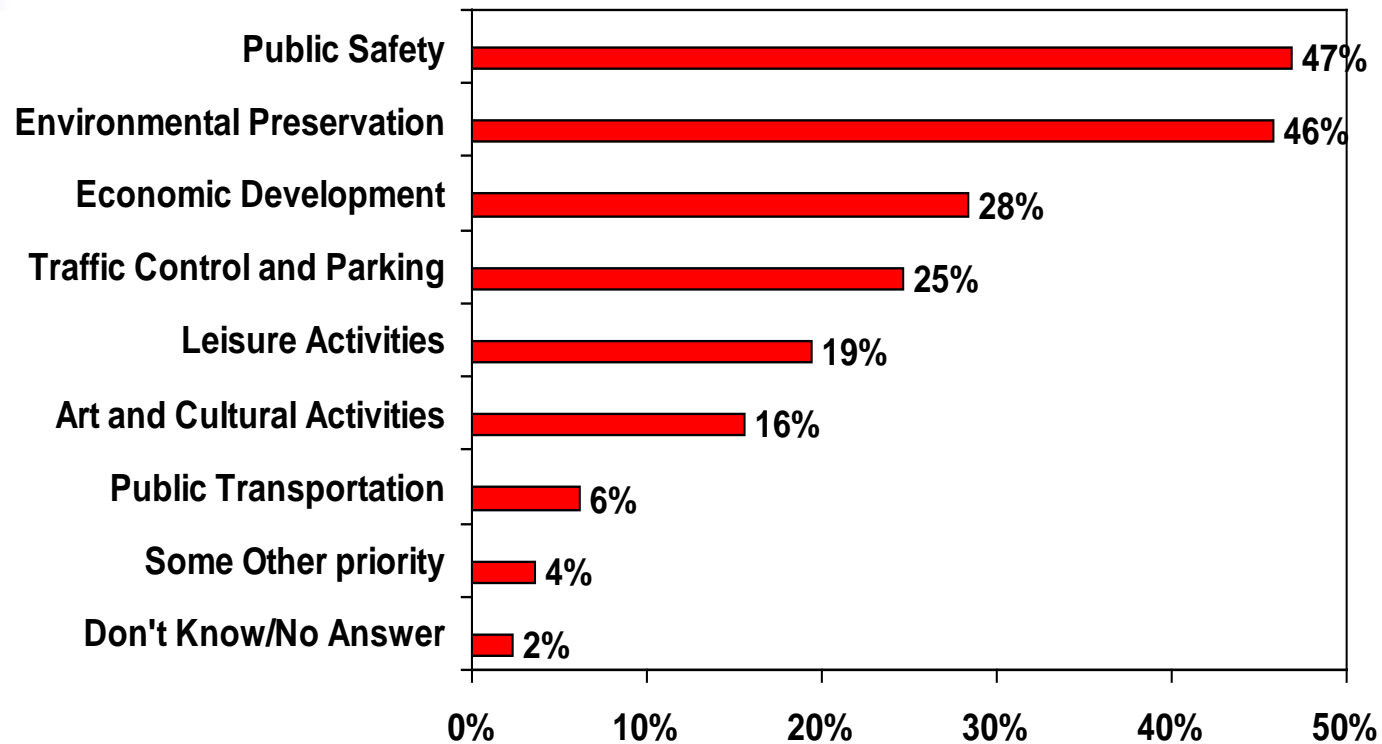

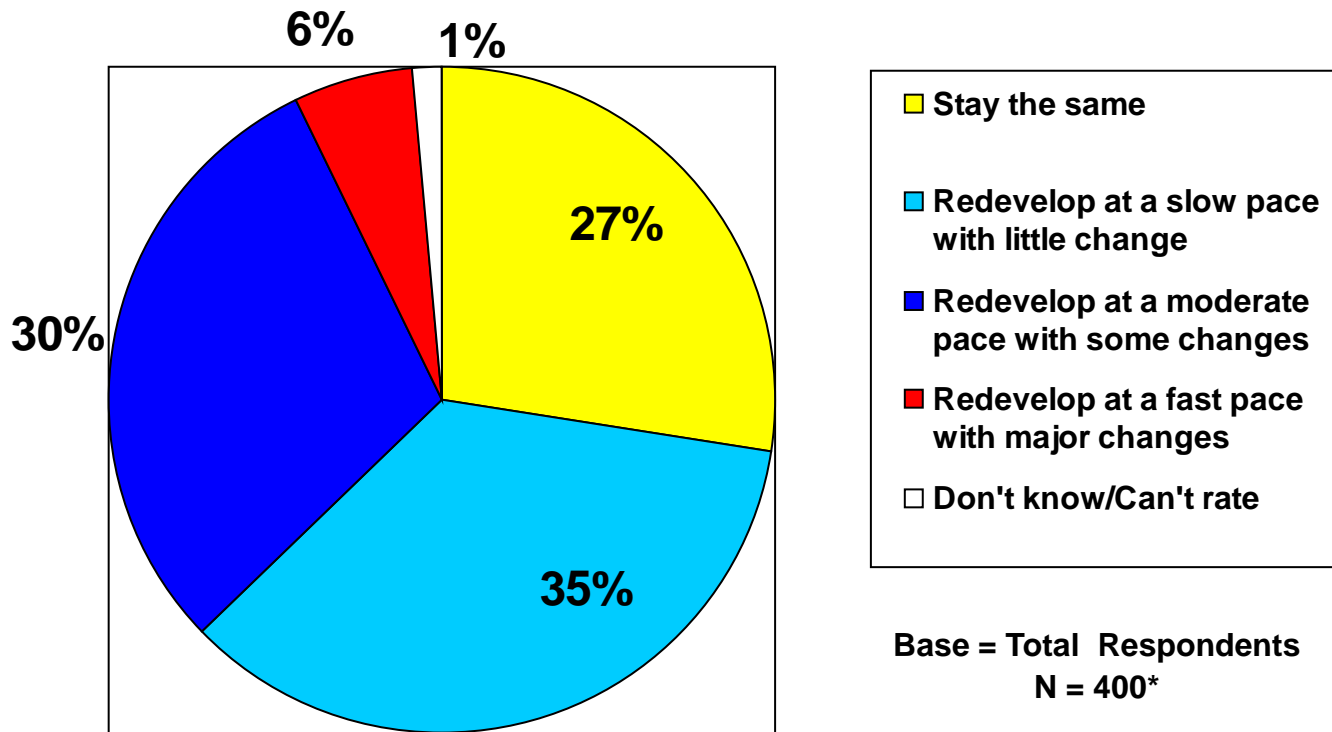


How People Would Like Downtown Redevelopment To Progress

- **Most residents of Safety Harbor like their city the way it has developed to date and would like further downtown development to be done:**
 - **At a gradual non-rapid pace**
 - 27% would like things to stay as they are
 - 35% want redevelopment to **proceed at a slow pace**
 - 30% want redevelopment to proceed at a moderate pace
 - **With building heights which reinforce the small town atmosphere.**
 - 83% want buildings confined to a 2-3 story maximum height
 - **In a manner that brings more retailers and restaurants to the downtown area, especially:**
 - Specialty retail stores like boutiques, clothing, gift or craft shops
 - Casual dining restaurants

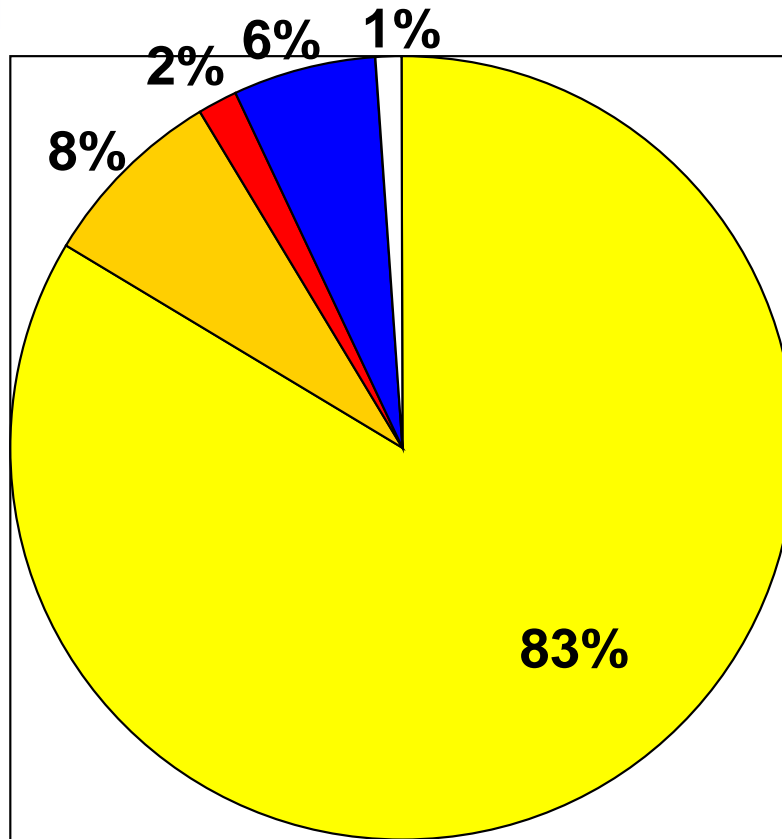
Pace At Which Residents Would Like To See Main Street Downtown Area Redeveloped In The Next 5 - 10 Years

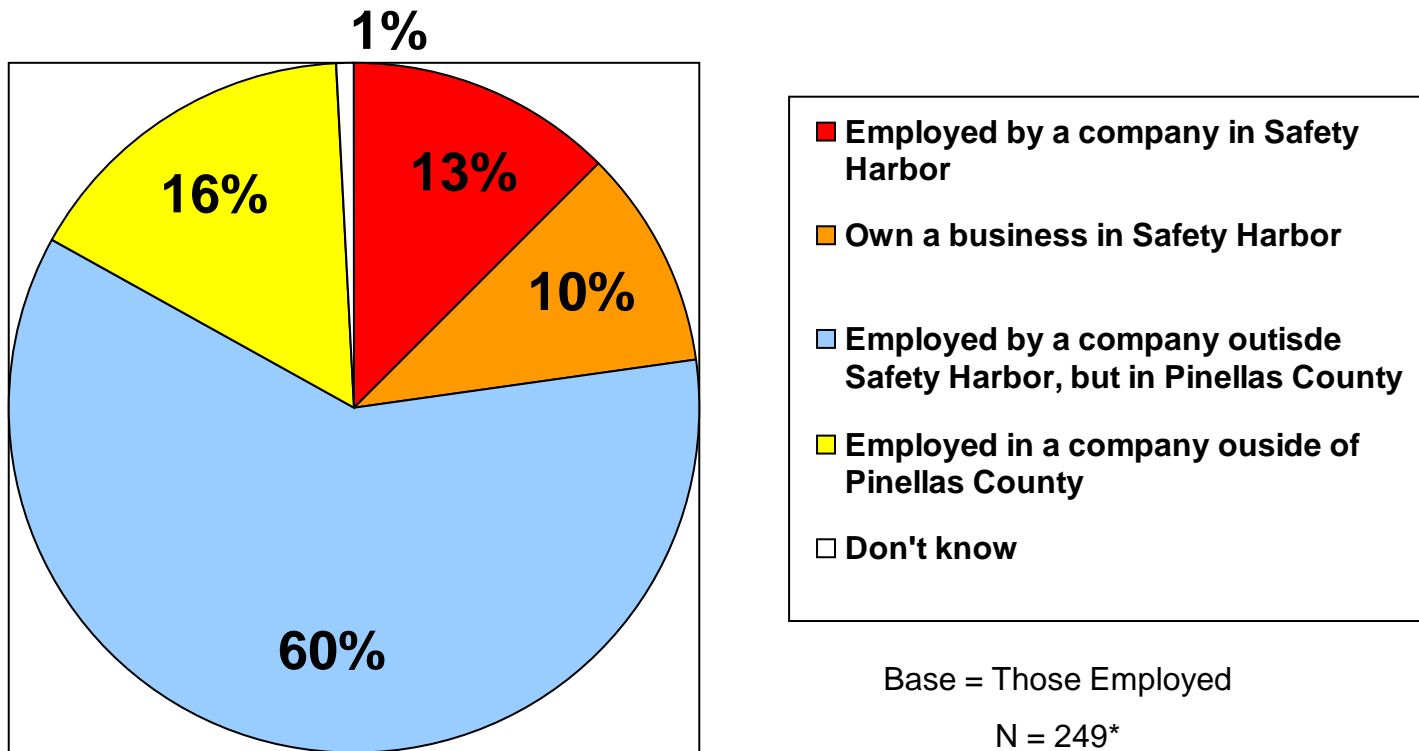
Demographic Profile Of the City and Study Sample

Demographic Profile Of The City and Study Sample

- **Most employed people living in Safety work elsewhere in Pinellas County.**
 - 23% either work in Safety Harbor or own a business in Safety Harbor.
 - 60% work for a company located elsewhere in the county.

- **The survey data collected provides an excellent representation of the residents of Safety Harbor.**
 - **The survey data weighted to reflect age and gender percentages closely reflects the Safety Harbor population on:**
 - Age and gender
 - Ethnic/racial heritage
 - Marital status
 - Employment
 - The percentage of registered voters.
 - **When analyzing the survey results, it is important to be aware that respondents, who chose to participate, skewed on the following characteristics:**
 - **Education** – They were more educated.
 - **Household size** – They were more likely to live in a household with three or more household members and less likely to live alone.
 - **Household income** – They were more likely to have an income of \$100K or more and less likely to have an income below \$50K.
