Fire Department Gains ISO Class 2 Rating by: Josh Stefancic, Fire Chief



This past fall the Safety Harbor Fire Department underwent a survey by the Insurance Services Office (ISO) to determine the fire district's public protection classification rating. ISO periodically collects and evaluates information from communities in the United States on their structure fire suppression capabilities. The data is analyzed using a rating schedule and then a grade is assigned to the community. A final rating score can range from a Class 1 (best) to a Class 10 (not the best); a Class 1 through Class 8 rating represents a fire suppression system that includes a creditable dispatch center, fire department, and water supply system. The Safety Harbor Fire Department has achieved an ISO Class 2 rating. This

rating will be utilized by insurance underwriters in identifying a property owners fire insurance premium.

Picking up after your dog isn't exactly the most enjoyable chore. It can be tempting to skip this task but doing so is not only bad for the environment and public health — in many places, it's also illegal. Why does picking up after your pet matter?

It's required by law. Many communities and municipalities require cleaning up after your pet. While this might be obvious in parks and public spaces with posted signs telling you to clean up after your pup, but even if you live in an area without posted signs or a homeowner's association enforcing the rules, the city or county has laws and regulations in place requiring you to clean up after your pet in public spaces.

Dog poop is not a fertilizer. People often believe that leaving dog waste to decompose is good for the grass, but the truth is that dog poop is toxic for the turf. A typical dog's poop is very acidic through the natural digestive process, enough to destroy grass underneath.

It's an environmental pollutant. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) describes dog waste as containing two types of pollutants: nutrients and pathogens. Dog waste that enters the waterways may carry pathogens that affect living things in the water and can make those people in contact sick. As well as, nutrients released from dog waste can stimulate growth of algae and other plant life, deeming the water unsuitable for recreational uses.

It can overwhelm the ecosystem. While you may think your own dog's poop can't do that much harm, keep in mind that your dog is likely one of hundreds in your area. iHeartDogs pointed out that while the ecosystem can generally handle up to two dogs per square mile, in urban areas, there are on average 125 dogs per square mile — far more than enough to overwhelm the local ecosystem with their waste. By picking up after your dog, you'll help protect the ecosystem.

The bottom line is, as unpleasant and annoying as dog cleanup might be, it's a minor inconvenience compared to the cost of neglecting this responsibility. By taking the extra minute or so to pick up after your pup, you're not only being a good citizen and responsible pet parent — you're helping to save the world, one piece of poop at a time.
