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FLORIDA-FRIENDLY LANDSCAPING & WATER RESTRICTIONS

We have officially entered the “dry” season and our region is currently experiencing a deficit of nearly ten inches of rain. This deficit impacts local water suppliers abilities to recharge drinking water sources including aquifers, rivers, and lakes which prompted Southwest Florida Water Management District to implement a Modified Phase 1 watering restriction for Pinellas County, limiting the amount and frequency that you are allowed to water your lawn to once per week. Residents can reduce the amount of irrigation used year-round by implementing Florida-Friendly Landscaping (plants, grasses, and trees that are native to local conditions). These plants and landscapes require little to no watering; ideal for any year including those that are drier than average. Florida-Friendly plants can be integrated into an existing landscape, used in designs such as rain gardens and natural landscapes, and have other benefits such as flood control, increasing biodiversity, and assisting in stormwater filtration.

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AROUND SAFETY HARBOR

WHERE DOES IT GO....LEAVES IN THE STREET *by: Renee Cooper, Public Works Director*



Leaf drop (dormant season tree shedding) in Florida occurs in the fall and winter. The City experiences the heaviest leaf fall during the months of February through April. During those three months, the City's street sweeping contractor increases sweeping frequency to twice per month. Please remember to park vehicles in the driveway so the sweeper can access the curb line.

Please do not place loose leaf piles at the curb, on the sidewalks, or in the roadway for collection. Do not rake or blow leaves into the street as the vegetation can present a flooding concern when washed into and thereby clogging storm drains. The vegetative debris later causes water quality issues at the point of stormwater discharge (algae blooms). Most of the phosphorus found in urban stormwater comes from leaves in the street during fall/winter and over fertilization in spring/summer.

Loose leaf piles should be containerized (bagged, placed in your City-issued garbage can or placed in a 32-gallon) and placed at the curb on your garbage collection day. Leaves can also be mulched in the yard (providing valuable nutrients to landscaping) or used in a compost pile. Residents, business owners, and civic groups can help educate others on the importance of keeping our storm drains clear of leaves and debris as well showing their artistic talents by signing up for the City's Storm Drain Mural Program.

The City's Adopt-A-Street program also encourages civic organizations, residents, and business owners to assist in removing trash and debris before it enters the City's stormwater system by volunteering to remove litter along a designated roadway. Contact Public Works for more information!

STREET TREE PROGRAM 2024 *by: James Ryan, City Arborist*

The City of Safety Harbor is continuing the Annual Street Tree Program. City residents can sign up to have a free shade tree planted in their front yard. All requests will be reviewed to ensure the selected tree is appropriate for the requested location and will not conflict with utilities.

Available trees include: Southern Live Oak, Gumbo Limbo, Bald Cypress, and Eagleston Holly. The trees will be planted by the city; however, applicants are responsible for watering the trees during the establishment period. A tree watering schedule will be provided to each applicant.

The deadline to apply is February 7, 2024. A waiver is required at the time of application. Applications and waivers can be downloaded from the city tree page at this address: cityofsafetyharbor.com/774/Tree-Protection.

IMPACT FEE UPDATE *by: Marcie Stenmark, Community Development Director*

The City of Safety Harbor is planning to update impact fees in 2024. New development within the City of Safety Harbor is subject to impact fees at time of permit issuance. Impact fees are assessed for new development to recover the cost of providing capital facilities to serve new development. The City of Safety Harbor City Commission adopted impact fees between 1976 to 1990. The impact fees included: sewer, sanitation, public safety (fire), library, park, and parkland. The City's impact fees have not been updated since they were originally adopted. In addition, the City has a mobility (transportation) impact fee that is coordinated with Pinellas County and was last updated in 2016.

In 2023, the City of Safety Harbor hired a consultant to review the City's impact fees and recommend updates based on Florida statutes. The City Commission held a workshop on May 1, 2023. The City Attorney prepared a draft ordinance (Ord. No. 2023-12) to update the City's impact fees. The impact fee update ordinance will be heard by the City Commission on Tuesday, January 16, 2024 (first reading), and Monday, February 5, 2024 (second reading). The meetings will start at 7:00PM. The revised impact fees will be effective March 4, 2024.

LIBRARY SECOND STORY CONSTRUCTION KICKS OFF IN JANUARY

We are excited to announce the City Commission approved the first-floor lighting upgrades and second floor addition at the December 4th commission meeting. A bit of library history... in 1994, the existing library facility opened in the current location. In 2008, after significant community input, the library underwent a renovation adding 9,300 square feet and celebrated a grand reopening in April 2009. Architectural design included the structural ability to accommodate a second story due to anticipated growth.

As the library became a cornerstone in the downtown district, we attracted high numbers of visitors and organizations due to our educational and cultural programs, resources, and meeting areas, making it difficult to keep up with the demand for space. In 2015, city staff began discussing the addition of the second story. The following year, the Library Foundation kicked off their Let's Build a Story capital campaign with a goal of raising \$500,000. They've met their goal and continue to fundraise due to increased costs. The Friends of the Library also support the project with a \$35,000 donation. Twenty-five percent of the construction is funded through grants and donations.

In March 2020, a design kickoff meeting was held with the architect and the commission noted the second story as a workshop goal. The pandemic then stalled the project. Fast forward to May 2023, when the site plan for the project was approved by the City Commission. In December, a general contractor was selected and the project approved.

The addition will add 4,784 square feet, including approximately 1,800 square feet of meeting room space. The Deaf Literacy Center will relocate to 2nd floor, vacating space on first floor for new Maker Space. There will also be a room with multiple desks for quiet self-study and remote business workspace needs.

During the construction, access to the children's wing, main meeting and conference rooms will be unavailable for use. Children's collections will be relocated within the library to serve our youngest patrons and their families. Our programs for all ages will move to remote locations within the community. Stay tuned to the library website and newsletter, social media, listserv, and staff for information. We'll operate a bit differently for a while but will provide the same services.

THE ELECTRIC RIIIIIDE... BOOGIE WOOGIE WOOGIE!

E-Vehicles are showing up everywhere! They are a fun alternative form of transportation allowing new users to explore. People are going farther and faster! They're getting outside and breathing fresh air and connecting with their community! With the sudden growth of e-bikes, scooters, and electric dirt bikes, lots of brands and new variations have emerged. Here are some general tips to keep you and your family safe while enjoying your electric ride!

10 Safety Tips to keep your ride REAL Fun:

1. Read the manufacturers details carefully before you purchase. Follow the recommended age, weight, and height. Be sure to review both the maximum weight and the minimum weight. Exceeding the maximum weight can result in brake failure and structural failure, while not reaching the minimum height/weight can result in loss of rider control. Batteries that power these vehicles are heavy. They weigh much more than traditional scooters or bikes. Lighter people and children may not be able to safely control the vehicle due to the increased weight.

2. Maintain your ride regularly. Due to the heavier weight, it takes more force to stop. This will cause brakes to wear down more quickly. If not properly maintained, brakes can fail. Inspect your brakes or take them regularly to a shop for adjustment/replacement.

3. Wear a properly fitted helmet! Check the top speed of your electric vehicle and find a helmet rated for that type of riding. Please note, a bicycle helmet may not be rated to use on an electric dirt bike. There are helmets recommended specifically for e-bikes. You wouldn't wear a bicycle helmet on a motorcycle!

4. Be seen! Wear bright colors and be sure to have front and rear reflectors and lights.

5. Pedestrians have the right of way. Respect pedestrians and use a bell or horn to warn them of your approach. Always reduce speed around pedestrians and avoid riding in crowded places. Remember, stopping distance is increased the heavier your ride!

6. Riders must obey all bicycle road rules and traffic laws including speed limits. Check vehicle class before purchase to ensure you will have a legal place to ride.

7. Check Consumer Product Safety Commission or cpsc.gov for recalls before purchasing and thoroughly research online forums for consumer feedback.

8. Battery Replacement. Do not dispose of or recycle lithium batteries at your home. Take them to a waste collection center for proper disposal. Also only use recommended batteries and charger for your vehicle.

9. Never carry anything on your handlebars it throws off your balance and can cause overcorrection and uneven weight distribution. Strings from bags can also become entangled in your front wheel.

10. Consider your riding experience before choosing to hop on an e-bike or scooter. If you are not a frequent rider, it is recommended that you practice before riding at higher speeds. Take it slow and ride within your abilities.

Be smart and enjoy your ride!


