The new school year is just around the corner, and we know what that means... back to homework, clubs and afterschool practices, and school buses and traffic. To get us off to a smooth start, I wanted to give you some reminders and tips and tell you about programs you may not have known about.

TRAFFIC TIPS


When school starts on August 10, we'll be back to more traffic, school zones, and school buses. Let's check out some safety tips from Florida Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles:

- Be alert and watch for children especially near schools, bus stops, school buses, and in school parking lots.
- Children on bicycles can be unpredictable and can make sudden changes in direction. Be especially careful when children are present in school zones and residential areas.
- Pay extra attention to lower speed limits in school zones.
- Watch for and obey signals from school crossing guards.
- Motorists are required to stop when approaching a school bus that is stopped with its red lights flashing and STOP arms extended.

HOMEWORK HELP & TEST PREP

Now that we've gotten to and from school safely, it's time for homework and studying! If your student needs help with their homework, test prep, or other school projects, look no further than the Safety Harbor Public Library. Homework Help with Teen Volunteers starts in September on Wednesdays from 3:00 – 6:00 PM for Kindergarten through 8th grade. Teen Volunteers will be at the library to help students with homework on a first come, first served basis.

For high school students, the library offers free SAT and college prep classes. You can find out more about these programs by searching the library's event website at events.safetyharborlibrary.org.



Another great resource through the library is the Florida Electronic Library at flelibrary.com. Available for free, it has many educational resources for all grade levels to help with homework and other assignments. One example is *Kids InfoBits* which features a subject-based topic tree search and full-text, age-appropriate, curriculum-related magazine, newspaper, and reference content for information on current events, the arts, science, health, people, government, history, sports, and more.

WEEKEND FOOD FOR KIDS

Did you know that many children who rely on school breakfast and lunch often don't have food to eat on the weekends? The Mattie Williams Neighborhood Family Center provides weekend food packs with ready-to-eat items for children. The Center partners with The Kind Mouse to distribute food to local kids. LUNCH PALS MENTORING

If you've ever wanted to give back into a child's life, but thought you didn't have time, you should check out the Lunch Pals Mentoring program. The Lunch Pals program pairs mentors with a student, and the two meet at the child's school for 30 minutes a week during their lunch period. This is a time for the mentor to get to know their mentee and spend time talking or doing activities. 

AROUND SAFETY HARBOR

WHEN TO CALL 911

Most folks will never need to hail emergency services; regardless, Safety Harbor Fire Department and our community partners are ready to respond day or night, year-round. Dialing 911 may seem intimidating, and some find the threshold for emergency services to be very high. In emergencies, time is precious and often dictates the outcome. Today, we'll differentiate between when to dial 911 versus contacting the fire station directly.


When faced with a life-threatening situation such as a fire, medical crisis, or other dangerous situation, do not hesitate to dial 911. Pinellas County has a robust emergency response plan that dispatches the closest available unit (Fire, EMS, Law Enforcement) to the scene and can even provide life-saving guidance in the interim.

Conversely, many non-emergency situations should be directed to your local fire station by phone or in person. Situations may include asking general questions (e.g., hazardous material disposal), reporting non-urgent concerns (neighbor's fire pit is safe yet burdensome), or requesting help to investigate a chirping smoke detector. The bottom line is every firefighter lives to serve the community, but we must ensure an appropriate unit response and remain prepared for true emergencies.

We hope this distinction helps clarify any ambiguity around contacting emergency services. Please contact our station at (727)-724-1520 with any questions, comments, or concerns.

WHERE DOES OUR WASTEWATER GO?

Have you ever wondered where the water goes after you flush the toilet, drain the bathtub, or run the dishwasher? The wastewater from your home or business travels through your private plumbing lines and into a sewer lateral connected to a gravity sewer main. Gravity sewer systems connect to pump stations. Pump stations lift the wastewater that cannot be naturally carried by gravity and push it through a force main pipe to the next section of gravity sewer. All of the City's wastewater ends up the City of Clearwater's Northeast Water Reclamation Facility. The City maintains 25 pump stations and over 74 miles of sanitary sewer piping.

How can you help? Please do not dispose of the following in any drains, including the toilet:

- Napkins
- Flushable Wipes
- Paper Towels
- Cotton Balls
- Dental Floss
- Feminine Products
- F.O.G (Fats/Oils/Grease)

Disposing of items in the sanitary sewer system can cause costly back-ups in your private home or business as well as in the City's sewer mains and pump stations. Clogs or back-ups as a result of items like flushable wipes and F.O.G. in the City's system can cause a sanitary sewer overflow (SSO) which is a reportable incident to FDEP (Florida Department of Environmental Protection) and could cause harmful bacteria to enter into the stormwater/surface water system. Call Public Works First! If you suspect a blockage in your sewer lateral, call Public Works at 727-724-1550.

Do you know about Safety Harbor's Diversity Advisory Board? The Diversity Advisory Board, or DAB for short, was formed in 2020 with the purpose of making Safety Harbor a welcoming and inclusive community that respects all residents, gives them full access to resources, and promotes equal treatment and opportunity, and engages residents in decision-making processes that affect their lives. DAB is made up of seven Safety Harbor residents who are committed to and passionate about this purpose.

Over the last three years, DAB has been active in the community hitting the streets on weekends and going door-to-door in different neighborhoods to talk to residents about different programs, events, and resources that are available to them. They've hosted or assisted with events throughout the City including diversity celebrations and Community Police Officer Meet and Greet events.

When the Board was created, the City Commission approved

six celebration months that would be recognized throughout the year by raising a flag at City Hall for the designated month paired with educational "Did You Know?" campaigns for each of the months. The celebration months include Black History, Women's History, Asian American Pacific Islander, Pride, Hispanic Heritage, and Native American Heritage.

DAB meets in the City Commission Chambers at City Hall on a regular basis, and meetings are open to the public. 
9. Start a Garden





WHEN IT RAINS, IT DRAINS.

Stormwater can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and flow into a storm sewer system that discharges to our local waterbodies. Help prevent stormwater pollution and drainage issues by following these simple steps:

- Pick up pet waste. Pet waste contains bacteria.
- Do not over fertilize or apply pesticides during the rainy season. Note, Pinellas County has a Fertilizer Ordinance that bans sale and use of certain fertilizers from June 1st-Sept. 30th.
- Do not blow yard clippings or leaves into the street. Once these enter the stormwater system they can clog storm drains and pipes causing flooding as well as causing harm to aquatic life once washed into the waterways.
- Do not drain your pool into the roadway/storm drain. Chlorine and saltwater can kill fish and pollute waterways. Drain pools into a vegetated area.

MISSING GARBAGE/RECYCLING PICK-UP?

Depending upon the address, residential garbage/yard waste/bulk pick-up occurs on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays. Recycling occurs on Thursdays and Fridays. To avoid missing pick-ups follow these simple steps:

- Properly prepare garbage by placing trash in the City provided can. No more than 10 bulk items can be placed at the curb. Place bins and items 3' from cars and mailboxes. Bundle/tie yard waste items. Place loose yard waste in the City issued can or a 32-gallon can.
- Do not place brush, plastic bags, plastic wrap, batteries, or trash in the recycling bins. Only place clean, recyclables in the recycling bin.
